- 1. Who is the speaker?
- 2. What reason does he give Dr. Watson for going to Grimpen Mire?
- 3. What is the actual reason why he goes to Grimpen Mire?
- 4. "A false step on it means death to man or beast." How does this line become true in the case of the speaker?

#### **Solution:**

- 1. The speaker is Stapleton.
- 2. He tells Dr. Watson that he goes to Grimpen Mire because he knows the place well and can navigate it safely.
- 3. The actual reason he goes to Grimpen Mire is to tend to and hide the hound he uses to terrorise the Baskervilles.
- 4. The line becomes true in the case of the speaker because later in the story, Stapleton himself gets trapped in the mire and presumably dies.
- 5. Soon after this conversation, Dr. Watson hears a strange and eerie howling sound coming from the moor, which adds to the mystery of the Hound of the Baskervilles.
