

Pusarla Venkata Sindhu, born on 5th July 1995 in Hyderabad, is a renowned Indian badminton player. Coming from a sports background, her parents, P. V. Ramanna (an Arjuna Awardee) and P. Vijaya, were volleyball players. She trained under Pullela Gopichand at his academy.

Sindhu won a bronze medal at the 2009 Sub-Junior Asian Badminton Championship, the Malaysian Open Title in 2013, and a World Championship medal in 2014. She bagged the Macau Open Grand Prix Gold in 2015 and won silver at the 2016 Rio Olympics.
