- 18. The poet refers to childhood, youth, old age, and death as the four stages of life. He imagines himself in the old age stage, symbolized by autumn, twilight, and a dying fire.
- 19. Drona blesses that Buttoo's name will be linked to self-help, truth, and modesty because of Buttoo's exemplary qualities. Despite being denied formal training, he taught himself archery and remained truthful and modest throughout.
- 20. The female crane was desperate as she circled the male's lifeless body and pecked at him repeatedly. She cried out in shrill, mournful tones, showing her anguish and futile attempts to bring him back to life.

Solution:

- 28. Basavanna's 'Vachana' emphasizes inner devotion over external rituals. He criticizes the building of grand temples for Shiva while ignoring self-purification. For him, the human body itself is a temple. True spirituality lies in personal transformation, not material offerings. The message is that devotion is an inner process, not about outward symbols.
- 29. In "Mending Wall," the speaker and his neighbor meet annually to repair the wall between their properties. The speaker questions the need for the wall, while the neighbor insists it's necessary for good relationships. The act of mending symbolizes maintaining physical and emotional boundaries despite questioning their necessity.
- 30. Lord Krishna recounts Karna's actions that violate fair play, including humiliating Draupadi, killing Abhimanyu unfairly, and supporting underhanded tactics in battle. These actions break the moral codes of war and chivalry. Krishna uses these examples to show the Kauravas' disregard for honor.
- 31. After stealing the boat, the narrator experiences guilt and fear, haunted by the image of a dark, towering mountain. The sight overwhelms him, filling him with internal conflict. This haunting experience reflects his moral transformation and the lasting impact on his conscience.
- 32. In March 1957, after the shooting of Benno Ohnesorg, students in Hamburg responded with protests demanding justice. The incident sparked widespread demonstrations against police brutality. It inspired a student movement calling for social and political change in post-war Germany.

His discoveries revolutionized microbiology, making his life both busy and impactful in the medical field.

This question shows her confusion as she transitions from a life of routine to one filled with new emotions. It represents her awakening and the uncertainty of her newly discovered self.
- 35. "Please God, make him think I am still pretty." In O. Henry's "The Gift of the Magi," Della silently prays, hoping that her husband Jim will still find her beautiful despite the sacrifice she has made. She sold her long hair to buy him a gift, and her concern for how he perceives her highlights her deep love and the sacrifices she made for him.
- 36. "Thief, dog, cut-purse, reptile, rapscallion, slubberdegullion! What have you done with my pie?" In Hugh Chesterman's "The Pie and the Tart," Gaultier, in an angry outburst, accuses Jean of stealing his pie using various insults. This phrase emphasizes Gaultier's frustration and the importance he places on the missing pie, revealing his intense emotional reaction to the loss.

- 40. The poet-father in the poem "A Letter to His Son's Teacher" by Abraham Lincoln wants the teacher to teach his son the following values:
- To listen to all, but filter information through the screen of truth and accept only what is good.
- To trust in his own abilities, as self-reliance breeds confidence in people and God.
- To be gentle with the gentle and tough with those who are tough.
- To sell his brawn and brain for a fair price, but never compromise his heart and soul.
- To ignore the howling mob and stand firm when he believes he is right.
- To be kind and courteous to everyone but have the courage to stand alone if necessary.
- To be gracious in both victory and defeat.
- To be a man among men, embodying strength and dignity.

41. "Water is the basis of all life."

Water is essential for all forms of life on Earth, as it is a fundamental component of the biological processes that sustain life. All living organisms, from plants to animals to humans, rely on water for hydration, digestion, transportation of nutrients, and the removal of waste products. Without water, cells cannot perform their functions, and biological systems would cease to operate. Water is also crucial in regulating temperature, facilitating chemical reactions, and supporting ecosystems. This is why it is rightly said that water is the basis of all life.

42. Gandhiji believed that moral actions must come from genuine intention, not from any form of compulsion. A truly moral act is one done voluntarily, out of inner



conviction and without external pressure. For example, a person who donates money to charity out of a sense of genuine compassion and desire to help others is performing a moral act. On the other hand, if the person donates only because of social pressure or to gain recognition, the act lacks true moral value. Gandhiji emphasized that actions driven by pure intent and free from any external coercion are what define true morality.

The marvellous gifts of science, which make modern life so comfortable as well as exciting, are there for everyone to see. But what cannot always be clearly seen are the problems that science has brought us, which were unknown to man a few years ago. Science is certainly very modern if we consider some of the problems it has created for us today.

One of these problems, which may become worse in the years to come, is that of 'Jet lag'. With the coming of modern jets, flying at more than 900 kilometres an hour, the world has become very small indeed. Today you can leave New Delhi at 6.00 in the morning, eat an early breakfast in the sky, over Kabul and be in London in time for lunch, by about 1.00 p.m.
