

The poem "The Height of the Ridiculous" is written by Oliver Wendell Holmes. It is a humorous poem that describes the poet's experience of writing amusing lines and their unexpected effect on his servant.

The rhyme scheme of the poem is ABCB, which adds to its rhythmic and lighthearted tone.


