Tragic Bus Accident Near Kondagattu Temple Claims 57 Lives

Jagityal, Telangana; 12th September 2018 — In a devastating incident, a Telangana State Road Transport Corporation (TSRTC) bus from the Jagityal depot plunged into a gorge near the Kondagattu temple, resulting in the loss of 57 lives, including the driver, and leaving 32 others injured.

The ill-fated bus was transporting 88 passengers returning from a pilgrimage to the renowned Kondagattu temple when the driver reportedly lost control, leading to the tragic descent into the gorge. Preliminary investigations suggest that brake failure may have been a contributing factor to the accident.

Local residents promptly responded to the calamity, assisting in rescue operations and transporting the injured to the Jagityal district hospital for immediate medical attention. Authorities have initiated a thorough investigation to ascertain the exact cause of the accident and to implement measures to prevent such tragedies in the future.

The state government has announced ex-gratia compensation for the families of the deceased and assured that the injured will receive the best possible medical care. This tragic event has cast a pall over the region, with communities mourning the significant loss of life.
