Though the house and grounds of our home in India were Grandfather's domain, the magnificent old banyan tree was mine-chiefly because Grandfather, at the age of sixty-five, could no longer climb it. Grandmother used to tease him about this, and would speak of a certain Countess of Desmond, an English woman who lived upto the age of 117, and would have lived longer if she hadn't fallen while climbing an apple tree. The spreading branches of the banyan tree, which curved to the ground and took root again, forming a maze of arches, gave me endless pleasure. The tree was older than the house, older than Grandfather, as old as the town of Dehra, nestling in a valley at the foot of the Himalayas.

The imagery of "green sods" symbolises graves, reinforcing the sorrowful tone. The phrase "moth-hour of the eve" creates a peaceful yet melancholic setting. The poem follows a ballad form with a rhythmic flow, and its theme of divine grace and selfless service is beautifully conveyed through simple yet powerful language.

Anton Chekhov was a renowned Russian playwright and short story writer. He was born on January 29, 1860, in Taganrog, Russia. He pursued his education at First Moscow State Medical University and was a physician by profession. Despite his medical career, he became famous as a playwright and short story writer. Some of his notable works include Three Sisters, The Cherry Orchard, and The Lady with the Dog. His contributions to literature earned him the Pushkin Prize. He passed away on July 14, 1904, in Germany.
