Solution:

Appreciation of 'The Ballad of Father Gilligan'

Theme:

The poem portrays Father Gilligan's selfless devotion, highlighting themes of compassion, the inevitability of death, and divine grace.

Imagery:

Vivid imagery like "half his flock were in their beds or under green sods lay" depicts widespread loss, while "moth-hour of the eve" creates a mystical twilight atmosphere.

Poetic Devices:

Alliteration: "Die and die" emphasizes the ongoing deaths.

Contrast: The priest's exhaustion contrasts with his unwavering duty.

Personification: "Moth-hour" gives nature a mystical quality, enhancing emotional depth.
